“ I spent all my weekends and my summers growing up with my grandfather. That was easy being I practically lived across the pasture from him. I was his side kick, his helper, his granddaughter, his favorite. Anything I ever wanted, was just a phone call away. He would make sure that I had it, even when it wasn't a "need". He taught me to drive a truck and to back up using my mirrors. I always rode the tractor with him (standing on the little step piece which wasn't much to stand on) and watched him as he would maneuver it throughout the pasture. He even let me drive it a few times. I would work in the garden with him even though that was the "job" I disliked the most. I would do it because I didn't want to let him down and I knew he needed my help with it. I helped cut his grass, hauled cows and feed them, hauled wood from trees and limbs that had fallen after he would cut them up with his chain saw, and mainly whatever he did, I did! We went to many auctions and cow sales together. I helped him deliver Meals on Wheels to elderly people for many years. I just had a bond that no other person had with him. I will always cherish the worker he taught me to be. Before he passed, he told me that I was a good worker and that he loved me. That was all I needed to hear. It doesn't mean that it won't be hard, it'll just be easier knowing that I have ALL these great memories of him that I will cherish forever. I know how much I helped my grandfather and I know how much he loved me.
